Huger Smith (#32); an 1866 translation of the New Testament into Dakota Sioux, bound with a Sioux translation of the Book of Genesis and Proverbs (#29); and an inscribed association copy of suffragist Anna Howard Shaw's biography, with tipped in photographs and correspondence (#31).



The American Indian as Slaveholder 1 and Secessionist: An Omitted Chapter in the Diplomatic History of the Southern Confederacy [and] The American Indian as Participant in the Civil War [and] The American Indian under Reconstruction. In Three Volumes. Cleveland: The Arthur H. Clark Company, 1915-1925. First Edition. Quartos. Three volumes: [1], 394, [1] pages; 403 pages; 419 pages. All volumes illustrated. Red cloth hardcovers with gilt titles on the spines. Gilt top edges. Untrimmed fore-edges. Volume 1 has a thin, light water stain on the front cover and a small water stain at the top edge of the text block, with light water stains to the top edge of a few beginning pages, including the title page. Cloth spine on Volume 3 is lightly sunned. Bindings are very sturdy and contents are very clean, otherwise. Frontispiece of Volume 1 is a map of the Indian Territory in 1861. This comprehensive study took a decade to complete, and fewer copies of Volume 3 were printed. Although this set is widely held in institutions, it is scarce in the trade. Howes A 9. Good+. (#12972)

Annie Heloise Abel (1873 - 1947) was "in the top rank of American historians of her generation" (*Notable American Women*), and an acknowledged expert on the history of British and American policy toward natives.



She was one of the first 30 women in the U. S. to earn a Ph.D., and, as one historian notes, "was the first academically trained historian in the United States to consider the development of Indian-white relations and, although her focus was narrowly political and her methodology almost entirely archival-based, in this she was a pioneer" (Anderson, "Annie Heloise Abel ... An Historian's History"). *The Slaveholding Indians* is widely considered her most important work.

The first issue of this short-lived (1896-1903) arts and crafts-style Southern literary magazine, featuring an article on Southern history, poems, a short story and gossipy discussions of the literary scene. The magazine was later bought by Andrew McConnell and became part of his "Alkahest System," along with lyceum lectures, a library plan, and an ideal community.



A fair copy, partially restored: spine ends patched; hinges repaired; new rear paste down; pages i and ii (front flyleaf) missing and replaced with a blank sheet of period paper; corner of pages iii and iv torn with partial loss of content, repaired as possible; closed tear to one leaf repaired with archival tape. Boards edge worn with light biopredation to corner of rear board and corner of last 40 leaves, not affecting text; two leaves of Contents section loose but present; lacking the binder's instruction slip. Occasional brown offsetting from pressed plants. Both the front paste down and the rear flyleaf illustrated advertisements are present. Period pencil inscription on the verso of the title page, "To Caleb Harrington Grass Valley Oct 22nd 1875 from WKS"; ownership signatures in pencil of Miss Hannah L. Kelley, Miss Pamela Kelley, and Henry Kelley. Harrington and five Kelley names are listed in the Grass Valley directory.

Includes directories of Nevada, Grass Valley, Meadow Lake, Bridgeport, Little York, Bloomfield and Eureka Townships. Directory also contains history sketches, mining information and several advertisements many of them illustrated. This is the first directory printed in Nevada County, California. 

5. [Major Henry A. Brotherton]. World War II Central Pacific Archive. Including photographs, military documents and 9 original cartoons of the 551st Ordnance H. M. Co. n. p.: n.p., 1944 - 48. A nice collection of material on the wartime experiences of Major Henry Alton Brotherton (1920 - 1986), a Warrant Officer from Iredell, North Carolina. The archive contains: original cartoons; approximately 225 various sizes and types of photographs of Brotherton, other servicemen, views of Hawaii, etc; letters from family in North Carolina; official army service forms and documents; an issue of *Army Times* dated November 27th, 1948, listing Brotherton as a Major under the "Warrant List"; a name tag for Lt. Henry Brotherton; a snarky traffic citation ("If all officers had the same attitude [as Lt. Brotherton toward parking rules,] this post would have to have an M.P. on every street and intersection which is neither feasible nor desirable"); and miscellaneous related ephemera.



The heart of the archive is the nine large black and white ink and pencil cartoons on eight sheets depicting soldiers performing various ordnance tasks on a base, presumably somewhere in the Central Pacific, accompanied by humorous commentary; one of the cartoons includes a sign reading "551st Ord. H. M. Co" [Heavy Maintenance Company]. The cartoons are unsigned, so it is unclear if they are Brotherton's work, but some of the soldiers depicted are named (e. g., T/5 [Eddie] Blackford, Mullins, "Big Joe" Galecki). The condition of these ranges from good to very good, with some edge tears and insect damage to one sheet. Very good condition overall. (#13148)







Lot of 5 consecutive issues, Volume V, Number 10 - Volume VI, Number 2. Stapled periodicals with titles and black and white photographs on the front covers. 45 pages; 47 pages; 45 pages; 41 pages; 51 pages. Small closed tear on the front cover of October issue. Some light rust located around the staples. Editorials for all 5 issues of *Indians at Work* were written by John Collier, and the *Editorials* volume reprints three years' worth of these editorials. Very good.

Collier joined the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) in 1933, serving as Commissioner until 1945. He soon began instituting a series of reforms meant to reinforce Indian sovereignty and improve access to health services and education, dubbed the "Indian New Deal," of which the landmark Indian Reorganization Act of 1934 was the centrepiece. Although a controversial figure among both agricultural and mining interests and some Native American tribes, he is generally credited with curbing federal abuses at a critical time and helping Native Americans survive the Depression. **10.** Cooper, Walter G. The Atlanta Cotton States Exposition was held from September 18th to December 31, 1895, on the grounds of today's Piedmont Park. It was a huge event attended by over 800,000 visitors, and was the site of Booker T. Washington's famous "Cotton States and Southern Exposition" speech. The speech, delivered to a primarily white audience on the first day of the fair, announced the "Atlanta Compromise," a verbal agreement between Washington, other African American leaders and Southern white leaders that African Americans would submit to segregation and discrimination in exchange for access to basic education and legal due process.



Howes notes of this work that it is a "description of American life of great influence in attracting European immigration in the post revolutionary period. As literature unexcelled by any American work of the 18th




century." Clark writes, "His [Crevecouer's] famous farmer's Letters cannot be exactly dated, and some were written after the events described. They are essentially essays of a philosophical character and as such reflect well the spirit of the eighteenth century. But they deal also with actual conditions and events witnessed by Crevecoeur. Thus their value as a historical source is of a peculiar kind, and the mixture of the actual and the ideal in the author's mind must be appreciated by the historian." **13.** [d'Estaing, Charles Henri Hector]; [Author unknown]. **Extrait du Journal d'un Officier de la Marine de l'Escadre de M. de Comte d'Estaing.** [Paris], 1782. Author unknown, however, he most likely served as an officer in d'Estaing's squadron, and is highly critical of his commander's conduct; d'Estaing led a fleet to aid the American revolutionary forces soon after France's entry into the war, and was mostly unsuccessful. This work describes the operations of d'Estaing's fleet in 1778-1779, from its various encounters with the British fleet to the failed siege of Savannah. Laid inside the back cover is an approx. 12" by 16" folded sheet of paper with manuscript song and a misc. dated envelope addressed to Miss Kate V. Ford 1891. Just





Lunsford Lane, once a slave from Raleigh, North Carolina, authored a memoir that was first published in 1842 in Boston. Contents of this biography includes Lane's memoir and a chapter on the famous 54th Massachusetts regiment during the Civil War. Very good. (#11176)

16. [Hutchinson, Thomas Ledger]. Autograph Letter (retained copy) from the "Mayors Office, Charleston, S.C. Feby 21st 1849 ... To His Excellency James K. Polk President of the **United States.**" [Charleston], 1849. One page letter on 8" x 10" blue unlined paper, folded vertically and horizontally. Two small tape repairs and the word "Duplicate" written in a contemporary hand on verso. A cordial letter from Thomas Ledger Hutchinson, then mayor of Charleston, South Carolina, and its city council, inviting Polk to visit Charleston in a few weeks' time, after his presidential term ended on March 4, 1849. Revealing the growing sectionalism that would soon bring the country to civil war, Hutchinson proclaims in the letter that Charleston's citizens "without distinction of party, [are] desirous that an opportunity should be afforded them to testify their approval of the firm and constitutional ground you have maintained upon the momentous question of Southern rights, & the consistency that has marked your official career from the dawn to its close." Polk's diary entry for February 26, 1849, acknowledges his receipt of the letter, and notes that, "I answered the letter & accepted the invitation." On March 8, Polk was met in Wilmington by a committee from Charleston, who escorted him by ship to the city; they arrived the morning of March 9th, where Polk was greeted by "a large concourse of Citizens... assembled on the wharf," a complimentary speech, and a military parade. He was presented to Mayor Hutchinson at noon, met with Governor Seabrook a bit later, and




in the evening was treated to a public dinner with the Mayor, Governor, and many other prominent citizens and local leaders. The reception, he wrote in his diary, was "most brilliant and everything connected with it was conducted with order and good taste. It was not only a warm, but an enthusiastic welcome, and every mark of distinction and respect, without regard to political divisions, was paid to me." (Quaife, *The Diary of James K. Polk During His Presidency 1845-1849. Vol. IV*, pages 352, 380-385.)

Thomas Hutchinson (1812-1883) was from a prominent family in South Carolina and Georgia, and served as mayor from 1846-50 and from 1852-55. He was President of the Charleston Library Society for a number of years, and was instrumental in saving many of their valuable books during the war. (*City of Charleston Year Book 1883*, pages 276-278.)





Notable autographs include: Commodore Isaac Hull (1773-1843), who commanded several U.S. naval warships, including the Constitution (this autograph pinned in); M[atthew] Arbuckle, renowned Boston cornet player, accompanied by a short drawn music stanza; a letter from J[esse] Walter Fewkes, the noted ethnologist and first person to use a phonograph to record indigenous people's speech for study; a pinned-in note from George E. Elliot to George H. Preble, the American naval captain, credited with taking the photograph of the Fort McHenry flag that inspired The Star Spangled Banner; another note to Captain Preble, this a pinnedin dinner invitation from historian George Ticknor, bearing the address of the Amory-Ticknor house in Boston (9 Park Street); Boston mayor and later Massachusetts governor, William Gaston, dated July 15, 1871; Mayor Nathan B. Shurtleff, dated July 13, 1871; a lengthy inscription from Wendell Phillips, the famed abolitionist and equal rights activist for Native Americans and women, dated August 22, 1871; a loose 1872 note addressed to Miss Belle Johnson and signed Dr. A. R. Shuter; "Ida Thayer June 22nd, 1871 Eating Club"; and other friends.

McKell consists of a log book kept on board the U.S.S. *Maryland* from June 25th, 1911 to August 30th, 1913 and a large photograph album from the same period. The log book measures 8.5" x 7.25" and has maroon leather spine and corners with cloth covered boards. There is a one-inch chip to the upper spine. The fore-edge has a dark stain not affecting the interior pages. The log consists of 301 lined pages of which 300 were used for daily entries. Pasted down inside the front cover are 3 souvenir illustrations of hotels in Hawaii: Hotel Demosthenes, Holo Hotel, and Kilauea Volcano House. A few loose ephemera items laid inside front cover. In the back of the log book are two loose log entries written on 6.5" x 5" note paper for August 29 and 30, 1913 the last dates covered in the diary.

The 10" x 8" photograph album is bound in brown suede and has an embossed "Dragon" design. The leather is scuffed, rubbed and edge chipped. The album consists of 188 photographs and photograph postcards. Laid inside the photograph album is a boxing advertisement with the heading "Entertainment and Boxing Exhibition Given by the crew of the U.S.S. Maryland Santa Elena, Ecuador, February 10th, 1912." Photographs are in very good condition. Good +. (#10900)

McKell's log/diary entries began June 25th, 1911, and are numerous and detailed. He records doing laundry, cleaning for the captain's inspections, visitations by other officers from different ships, boxing matches, football games, swimming, volcano sightseeing, etc. Once he writes being reported for "neglect of duty" and the ensuing consequences.

From July 1 to October 28, 1911 McKell's usual log entry begins with "In the Navy Yard" spending most of his time painting and working on the ship while stationed in San Francisco. July 22 he writes "Hager fell over board and drowned sent two divers down never found him." January 1912 the U.S.S. *Maryland* departed for South America arriving in Ecuador February 1. February through March 1912 the ship patrolled the South American coast, passing through Salvador, Panama, Nicaragua, Honduras, and Guatemala. The sinking of the *Titanic* is noted on April 19, 1912. Another interesting entry written that month on April 23 reads, "torpedos shot at ship (U.S.S. Maryland [sic]) putting two holes in the Starboard."

In the summer of 1912 the U.S.S. *Maryland* sailed from California up the Pacific Coast. In July, the ship departed Bremerton, Washington, for Sand Point, Alaska, and Prince William Sound, returning to Bremerton in August. The ship later anchored in Seattle and prepared for its trip to Yokahar, Japan, arriving September 10, 1912. In the fall of 1912 the ship embarked from Honolulu to Acapulco Mexico, sailed down the coast of Honduras, and spent November in Nicaragua, docking for the winter in Mare Island Navy Yard. The ship departed Mare Island in mid-March 1913 for San Diego Bay, and in April docked at Coronado Island. The last entry recorded is August 29th, 1913.





Brown, Esq., a prominent Atlanta attorney and the brother of the Confederate governor of Georgia, Joseph E. Brown. The inscription is dated "Augusta Georgia November 22nd 1886."

John Perceval, 1st Earl of Egmont (1683-1748), was, after James Oglethorpe, the most responsible for the successful establishment of the colony of Georgia. He was instrumental in obtaining the 1732 charter from the Crown to colonize the Province of Georgia, was the first president of the Board of Trustees, and worked tirelessly in Parliament to ensure that the colony's interests remained protected and well-funded. "So careful was the Earl of Egmont in keeping these minutes," writes Jones in the Preface, "so accurately is the chronology of act and event noted, and so clearly expressed is the narration, that [the original] manuscript, — which may be justly accepted as the London record of the Trustees' proceedings — is placed in the printer's hands just as it came from the pen of this early and illustrious benefactor of Georgia."





typed, copied biographical sketch of Park, and a small photograph of Shaw in her garden; and a brief newspaper obituary for Shaw, with the date of her death, July 4, 1919, written on it. The letters are dated May 13th and May 14th, [1919], with the latter typed on Council of National Defense letterhead. In it, Shaw declines a stay at Mrs. Cone's: "I have a very important engagement in Washington on the 19th and must leave Greensboro on the night of the 20th so as to reach my next point in Vermont on the 22d. I am sorry to be so hurried but it seems important work and I have given up all hope of rest until I get to Heaven..." Shaw was due to join former U.S. President William H. Taft and Harvard President A. Lawrence Lowell on a speaking tour to rally public support for the League of Nations; she came down with pneumonia in June, and died a few weeks later.

Anna Howard Shaw (1847 - 1919) was a major leader in the women's suffrage movement, serving as president of the National American Woman Suffrage Association (NAWSA) from 1904 to 1915. She was personally recruited to the National Woman Suffrage Association (NWSA, one of the precursors to the NAWSA) by Susan B. Anthony in 1886, was Vice President of that organization from 1892-1904, and regularly travelled around the country for over three decades giving speeches and meeting with politicians and other leaders in the suffrage movement. She lived to see the 19th amendment pass through Congress, though not to see it ratified.
